2.12 How does IQAC Contribute/Monitor/Evaluate the Teaching & Learning processes:

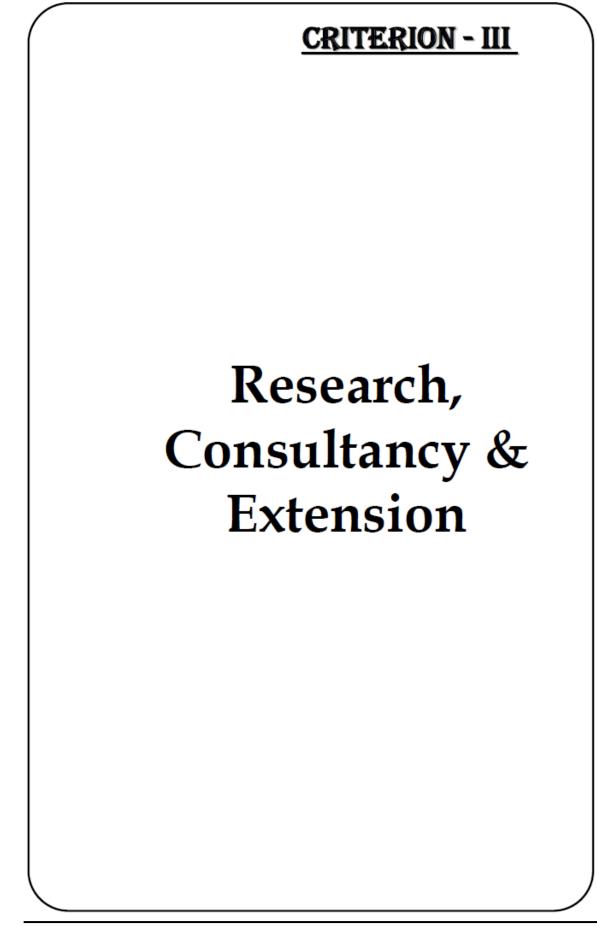
- IQAC, in their first meeting, wanted to know the problems, if any, in taking classes. IQAC also analyzed the feedback already received.



#### **BEST PRACTICE # 01: 2011-12**

#### Title: Different modes of teaching aiming at effective involvement of students.

Context: To make the students more participative in the classes.

#### The objectives:

To enrich the students with good knowledge base, creativity and clarity of thinking.

#### **The Practice:**

The usual method of lecture based class room teaching seems to appear monotonous to the students. As a result of which, frequently the students lose their concentration and the class at the time appears to be more painful to them. To remove monotony and to bring fresh air in the mind of the students the participatory mode of teaching-learning process is followed by certain departments. Thus the students get a new dimension where they can speak in their own way on the topics of discussion. The students then freely expressed their opinion and they asked for advanced study materials on that subject from the teacher. Accordingly, interest creation, free opinion, love for study, removal of monotony and creativity resulted.

Generally, Group Discussions on relevant topics and key elements of personality developments are dealt with the students. In this case, various students gave their opinion in their own way and made the discussions meaningful and effective. Through different internal seminars the teachers asked the students to demonstrate their perceptions. Here the teachers played the role of coordinators. After going through their different lectures the teachers gave their opinion in such a way so that the new dimensions emerged.

#### **Obstacles faced/Problems encountered:**

Most of the students of our college come from remote rural areas. Many of them are the first generation learners. Accordingly, the question of expressing free and clear opinion occasionally challenged by their family and social background. 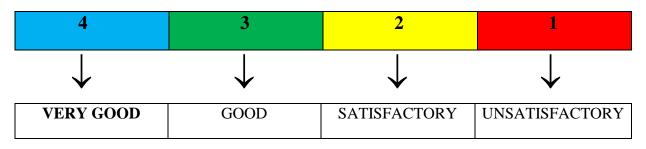
